On 6 May 2021 we began a new fouryear Council term after an uncontested election.

Of our full complement of sixteen councillors, eleven returned after the last term and five were new to the Town Council. Three of the new Councilors are also Wiltshire Councillors: they add a new dimension for the benefit of our community by helping to develop an effective working relationship with our partners in Wiltshire Council.

Combining the invaluable experience of long-serving councillors with the opportunity for new councillors to contribute ideas has created a real driving dynamic, which this year has helped keep the council in good health and focused on the important work of responding to local needs.

With sadness in July the Council saw the passing of Councillor Bryan Castle, who was a long serving councillor and ex-Mayor. I would like to take the opportunity to convey the Council's gratitude for all his service and contributions over the years.

The vacancy Bryan's passing created went on to be filled by way of co-option by

particularly during the pandemic and with staffing matters.

The highlights of the year for me have been to see the reemergence of the civic events once again, demonstrating Marlborough's commitment to its community both past and present. It was a privilege once again for

2021-22 has been of year of post pandemic recovery for the Council, as it has for everyone. The Planning Committee meets roughly every three weeks, with the other Committees meeting four to five times a year. They have delegated powers to oversee the Council's services relevant to each. Additionally, the Council has a Staffing Sub Committee which has responsibility for staffing matters.

The Committees then report to the Full Council, which has oversight of all matters, and particularly those which cut across the responsibility of more than one Committee.


#### PLANNING COMMITTEE

# Chairman: Councillor Nicholas Fogg

All Town Councillors sit on this Committee, with the Mayor in an ex-officio role so with no vote. It meets every 3 weeks to consider planning applications, road closures, premises licenses, work to trees and planning associated consultations. In total, the committee met 17 times in 2021/22.


#### PLANNING APPLICATIONS

The Town Council is a consultee on planning issues: decisions are made by Wiltshire Council as the Local Planning Authority (LPA). Councillors need to make sure that any objections are made on sound material planning grounds which link to the National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) and policies set out in the Wiltshire Core Strategy.





The number of planning applications received to 30 March 2022 was 127. Wiltshire Council refused five: all were applications where the Town Council had raised objections.



#### TREE WORKS APPLICATIONS

Marlborough's Tree Warden is Councillor Don Heath who has a good knowledge of the town's trees and advises on various applications for works (felling, pollarding, etc.) and often visits sites. He is also the local town and parish representative to the Council of Partners for the North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty and is always pleased to hear from those with an interest in environmental conservation.



#### MARLBOROUGH AREA NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN



Councillor Hall is Chair of the Steering Group working on the production of the Marlborough Area Neighbourhood Plan (MANP) which covers land use in Marlborough with Manton and the neighbouring parishes of Mildenhall and Savernake. The group is made up of representatives from those parishes as well as other interested groups and individuals.



The Town Council is the qualifying body for the process.

To date, 2021-22 saw the MANP move through Regulations 14-17 of the Neighbourhood Planning process, which included responding to the rigour and scrutiny of independent examination.

#### COMMUNITY AREA TRANSPORT GROUP (CATG)

The CATG is a partnership forum led by Wilshire Council that identifies and agrees local priorities for highway projects. The Town Council's representatives to this Wiltshire Council Area Board subgroup are Councillor Mervyn Hall and Councillor Richard Allen.

In the last year some of the issues being progressed include:

- Traffic calming at Frees Avenue
- A crossing in Marlborough High Street
- Traffic calming on the A4 Manton section

(CATG changed its name to LHFIG in 2022 – Local Highway and Footway Improvement Group – and at the same time broadened its scope to include improvements for pedestrians and cyclists)



#### SPEED INDICATOR DEVICES

Speeding presents a danger to the community, whether they are children on their way to school or less mobile people crossing the roads. Marlborough Town Council has one Speed Indicator Device (SID) which it rotates around town to remind drivers to slow down and is in the process of purchasing a second: the SIDs are managed in rotation at approved locations. The data helps the Council understand the extent of the speeding issue as well as providing evidence for partnership working with the Police and Wiltshire Council Highways to improve road safety.



#### YELLOW LINES

The Planning Committee made three requests this year for refreshed or new yellow lines at Cardigan Road, The Parade and Elcot Lane.

Requests for yellow lines, whether they are to replace worn markings or add new lines, need to go to Wiltshire Council annually each January.

Residents are encouraged to make the Council aware of places they think they are needed.



# FINANCE & POLICY COMMITTEE

# Chairman: Councillor Andrew Ross

The Finance & Policy Committee is responsible for the management of the Council's finances and policies, and it met four times in 2021/22. Its most important work is to steer the Town Council in setting its budgets. It considers what funds it needs (the costs of running services, staff salaries, capital projects, etc.) and matches its estimates against planned income (funds from investments, rental income, venue hire and more). The shortfall is what it needs to raise from local council taxpayers: known as the precept. Wiltshire Council collects this on behalf of the Town Council and it is paid in two instalments during the financial year.

#### AUDIT AND ANNUAL GOVERNANCE REVIEW

The Council is rigorously audited to check that the Council as a whole exercises due diligence over the use of public funds and assets, and to check that risk management arrangements are in place. This occurs internally throughout the year, and at year end by an appointed external auditor.

To the credit of the Finance & Policy Committee and the staff involved, the mid-term audit reflected that:

#### PRECEPT & BUDGET SETTING

December is the time of year when Local Councils have to decide on their budget for the coming year. This can be a difficult process of balancing costs against services, community needs and ambitions, resulting in a local precept rise which can be used to fund locally defined services and projects.

The precept of 4.9% was decided at the Full Council meeting in January and reflected an emerging Development and Action Plan for the Council term of 2021-25, whilst allowing for rising fuel and employer costs, a degree of post pandemic recovery, the reinstatement of grounds team capacity lost as a budget saving in the previous year, and the requirement for activity in response to the climate emergency.

The overall Council Tax you pay helps towards a variety of services. The largest proportion is for those provided by Wiltshire Council such as education, housing, roads, car parks, bin collections, and social care right across the county. Also collected by Wiltshire Council are the precepts set by Wiltshire Police Authority and Wiltshire Fire & Rescue Services. The proportion of the Council Tax collected for the running of your Town Council and your most local services is around 10% of your overall annual Council Tax bill.

#### **GRANT AWARDS**

With a budget of £6,500 the Finance & Policy Committee made awards to five organisations, all meeting criteria showing that the work they do benefits Marlborough.




#### **POLICIES**

The Council's Policies are important as they provide the framework for all Council activities and decisions. The Finance and Policy Committee also holds responsibility for oversight of the Council's standing orders and policies. This year this has meant the revision of the Standing Orders on two occasions to improve practice, the adoption of a Climate and Environment Protection Policy Statement, a Corporate Identity Policy and a draft Electronic Communications Policy.


#### **EXPENDITURE - HOW YOUR MONEY IS SPENT**

# **PROPERTY COMMITTEE**

The Property Committee is responsible for all Town Council owned properties and has met 4 times in the last year. It exercises landlord responsibility on behalf of the Council and monitors the overall upkeep and sustainability of the Council's property assets.

#### **TOWN HALL**

The building was first opened in 1903 and as a listed building needs careful structural monitoring. External refurbishment works were completed over the summer of 2021 and Marlborough Town Hall is gleaming once again having undergone a comprehensive external spruce-up. Our thanks go to the public for their patience during any disruption caused by the works.

2021 has seen the recovery of the Town Hall bookings which were significantly affected by the Covid pandemic and restrictions.

#### MARLBOROUGH COMMUNITY & YOUTH CENTRE

Since taking this building on from Wiltshire Council under a 7-year lease in 2017 and after extensive refurbishment, it is becoming an important centre for local community groups. It offers its own car park, a multi-use sports hall, a soundproofed music room, a social area with a pool table and large screen TV, a computer suite, a fully equipped kitchen and a coffee bar area. The building is alarmed and covered by a CCTV system.

# COMMERCIAL AND RESIDENTIAL PROPERTIES

The Council owns three shops and seven residential properties. These corporate properties are managed and rented out through our professional property agents. Different arrangements are in place for some Councilowned assets from which community groups,

Youth clubs, sports teams, health & fitness groups, educational classes, service providers (e.g., Wiltshire Police and Wiltshire Council) and private hirers all use the facilities.

Marlborough Youth Football Club uses the specially reconfigured changing rooms and adjacent pitch at weekends.



sports clubs or Trusts operate (e.g., The Merchant's House, the Bowls Club, Rugby Club, Golf Club and Boxing Club.) In January 2022 the Council agreed to an extended lease for the Merchant's House Trust to support its ability to seek funding sources from charitable trusts.

#### **PUBLIC TOILETS**

The Council provides public toilets in two locations, one at George Lane Car Park and one at the Town Hall.

In 2021-22 the toilets had 29,330 visits and generated an income of £5,866, partially offsetting the cost of business rates, utilities, cleaning, maintenance etc.


#### **NEW PROJECTS**

The Council is working towards creating a new workshop facility for the Grounds Team. With more services being provided by our own team and possibly more to come from Wiltshire Council, the current facility at the Salisbury Road Recreation Ground is no longer fit for purpose.

#### AMENITIES & OPEN SPACES COMMITTEE

Chairman: Councillor Don Heath

The Amenities and Open Spaces Committee is responsible for all Town Council owned parks, open spaces, and play areas. It met six times in 2021/22. Integral to this Committee's work is our Grounds Team, headed up by Grounds Manager, Nigel Weatherly. Based at the Workshop at the Recreation Ground, our team maintains various open spaces in and around Marlborough and Manton – The Common, The Green, Priory Gardens and Wye House Gardens, Elcot Lane Village Green, Salisbury Recreation Ground and the Skate Park, Jubilee Field, and the cemeteries. The Grounds team assist with Stonebridge Meadow and the Council's allotments. Additionally, they cut grass, pick litter, maintain our street furniture and bus shelters, plant and look after floral displays and bedding, mark out pitches and keep an

eye on the condition of trees (more than 1,500 of them) as well as dealing with the street preparations for events – all the things that make a difference to residents and have a real impact on our visitors.



#### **ELECTRIC TOOLS**

In June the workshop suffered a break-in, and all the Council's power hand tools were stolen. We replaced all but the chainsaws with electric tools in support of reducing our environmental impact.

#### SKATE PARK

In response to the community's demand, in October we saw the installation of the new lighting for the skatepark, and it has proved to be very popular with the young skaters.

The Common is used for sport and recreation as well as being a popular place for dog walkers. It's

also a venue for various events and activities (e.g., circuses, fairs, boot sales and pigeon

#### STONEBRIDGE MEADOW

#### VICTORIAN CEMETERY

The Friends of the Old Victorian Cemetery, working with our Grounds Team, continue to make enormous progress at this special site. This closed cemetery is steeped in local history and well worth a visit.

#### **PRIORY GARDENS**

These gardens form a beautiful piece of open space right in the centre of town directly accessible via a path from the High Street.

Priory Gardens is a special amenity, well maintained by our Grounds Team with flower beds, green space and a place for all to enjoy their leisure time. Everyone is welcome – residents and visitors, young and not so young.



#### LITTER BINS AND STREET FURNITURE

Did you know that Marlborough Town Council empties 45 bins all year round 2-3 days a week in the winter months and 6-7 days a week in the summer?

# **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT**

#### COMMUNICATION WITH THE PUBLIC

We always endeavour to respond to all public enquiries. This could be residents or visitors calling at our offices, a phone call, via social media or emails or a formal question via either the Town Clerk or the Council.

#### IN PERSON

All residents are welcome to attend our Town Council and Committee meetings held in the Town Hall (via videoconferencing during the pandemic lockdowns). Each meeting starts with public question time – your question does not need to be related to an agenda item.

Residents and visitors are also welcome to call in to our enquiry office at 5 High Street during office hours.

#### **IN PRINT**

Until February we published our news in Marlborough Town & Country Magazine which regularly landed on doormats in the town. Sadly, the magazine has now ceased publication: we'd like to thank the Editor, Andrea Jerome for her support and for such a high-quality publication which we know our residents really valued over the years.



#### WEBSITE AND GOOGLE

An important part of the Town Council's role is the proactive use of our website and social media. This helps to engage with communities, keeping them informed about Town Council activities and what's happening at a local level. The Town Council website can be found at <a href="www.marlborough-tc.gov.uk">www.marlborough-tc.gov.uk</a> and is the main place to go to get information about the services we offer, find out about our meetings and keep up to date with our news.


Between January and December 2021 there were 4,596 unique visitors to the Town Council's website: they made 7,278 visits to 132,596 pages, averaging about 22,000 page visits per month. These might otherwise have been phone calls to our enquiry point.

Many people go to Google as a first port of call for information: in the 6-month period up to mid-April 2022:

5,657 people looked us up
76 used the 'call' button to phone us
234 got directions via Google maps
500 clicked through to our website

In addition to the main Marlborough Town Council website, we set up a dedicated small site in the run up to the Dark Skies Festival; this was linked to a DarkSkiesFest At Home YouTube channel when the planned festival in 2020 had to go online as the country was under orders to #StayAtHome. Contributors who would have been present at the festival kindly made videos which we broadcast via the Facebook Festival page over the course of a day in October. We were very happy to welcome them in person for the festival in 2021.

Finally, our team took over the Marlborough in Bloom website in 2020 when the Committee disbanded and will continue to look after it while the Bloomers are taking a rest from competition entry.



#### **SOCIAL MEDIA**

Our main Facebook page for disseminating information about the Town Council, @MarlboroughTC, has just under 2,000 followers but regularly reaches around 12,000 people each month. We have fewer followers on Twitter at just under 1,000 at @MTCwilts, although our posts regularly reach ten times that number of

#### **NOTICE BOARDS**

There are Town Council notice boards at the Town Hall, Manton High Street and Stonebridge Meadow where we share good old-fashioned paper posters, meeting agendas, notices of elections and other items of public interest.

#### **CLIMATE EMERGENCY**

Formed in the previous year, the Council continued with its Climate Emergency Working Party, working with representatives from the community to further Marlborough's response to the climate emergency and help inform the Council of action it can take. Former councillor Susie Price is the working party's chair, with Councillor Jo Waltham as the vice chair. Councillors Hall, Heath, the Town Clerk and Assistant Town Clerk also support the group and act as Council representatives and intermediaries.

The working party has supported the Council in its formation of a Climate and Environment Protection Policy Statement, challenging all Committees to consider how they can include climate action in their remit, securing an initial budget to commission an environmental impact assessment to audit the Council's services and activities and advise on positive action it can take going forward to reduce its carbon footprint and adopt environmentally friendly practices.

#### MAYOR MAKING

#### PEPPERCORN RENT

Alison Galvin-Wright, Chair of the Trustees handed over a ceremonial bag of peppercorns to our Mayor, Councillor Mark Cooper to pay in full, witnessed by the Lord Lieutenant, Trustees, Councillors, Mr & Mrs Bayly and guests.

2021 marks the 30th anniversary of the Merchants House Trust but, after standing in the High Street for nearly 370 years this iconic 17th century building is in need of repair. The Merchant's House 30th Anniversary Appeal is aiming to raise £150,000.



#### 4TH MILITARY INTELLIGENCE BATTALION FREEDOM PARADE
